own school or within their own classroom in the areas of discussion. The discussions are open, honest and frank. Notes are taken and information is shared both with the colleagues at the meeting but also with all colleagues across the Trust.

In many ways however, the networks are just the beginning of the collaboration journey. We find that the networks only represent around 20% of the collaborative activity in the Trust. It is guite common for colleagues, who have built friendships and professional respect with people doing the same roles in different schools, to informally collaborate on a range of projects, which are

not mandated from any central standpoint or from any particular leader but are actually grown from a need and desire to work together outside of the network meetings. It is precisely this type of informal collaboration that is driving the progress in our schools and has secured the outcomes we have achieved for children over the last year.

We actively encourage colleagues to "maximise their togetherness" and to commit to working with each other in an open, honest and transparent way, sharing their skills, knowledge, experience and resources.

One of the areas that we are seeking to develop this year, is a similar type of networking opportunity and professional development resource for our fantastic Teaching Assistants. We have over 150 Teaching Assistants in the Trust and a key priority for us is to use our combined resources across our group of schools to give these colleagues the very best professional development.

ne of the great opportunities afforded to our family of schools is the opportunity to work in close partnership. I thought it might be helpful for parents and interested parties to understand how we do this.

One of the key approaches we take, in giving colleagues across the Trust a chance to work together, is our formalised networks, these networks operate in a range of areas, subjects and aspects of school life.

We run networks in Senior Leadership, Middle Leadership, Early Years, YR2, YR6, Maths, English, Special Educational Needs (SEND), Early Career Development and ICT to name but a few. Every

network is chaired and facilitated by one of our Heads of School who ensure that all colleagues contribute and benefit from this chance to work together and share ideas. This also encourages Heads of School to not only take responsibility for their schools but to also take responsibility in a particular area for all the schools within our Trust.

You will see below, short pieces from the Heads of School who lead the networks in Early Years, Maths, English and SEND with a comment on what it is like to lead their network. Colleagues that attend the network meetings are encouraged to bring examples of best practice but also the challenges they face in their



Pathway. I would like to begin by extending a very warm welcome to the entire school communities of Bickleigh-on- Exe C of E Primary School and St Andrew's Primary School who joined our Trust on 1st September 2015.

For me this term started wonderfully, as I was privileged to attend the Trust non-pupil day on 2nd September 2015, along with some of our other non-Executive Trust Directors. The day began with a keynote address from the CEO in which he outlined the compelling vision for the Trust, the challenges ahead and a review of the performance of the Trust. I am delighted to report that results for last year were once again an improvement on the previous year. As a cohort, our 238 year 6 children achieved above the national average on every key measure for attainment and progress. Similarly, our KS1 children achieved strongly with all measures above national expectation. The CEO's opening address was followed by a range of networking and training opportunities for all staff. It was great to see our entire staff team working together, sharing their experiences and ideas, the energy and dynamism was palpable as over 400 colleagues shared their thinking, learning and plans for the year. Teachers, Teaching Assistants and Administrators worked together, with colleagues from across all 11 schools, planning a shared project to mark the Queen's achievement in being the longest

serving monarch. As you will see throughout this newsletter, the focus of that day and so much of our work is school-to-school support and collaboration. I thoroughly enjoyed seeing firsthand the high level of professional collaboration, it really was a case of the Trust in action.

As well as the high levels of school-to-school support and collaboration that exists across our Trust, we are also very active as a Trust working across the region. I personally attended a session at the end of November with Sir David Carter – Regional Schools Commissioner, in which he encouraged Multi Academy Trusts to work together. I am delighted to note that we have a range of active reciprocal partnerships with Multi Academy Trusts across the region, supporting a range of schools in our local area and across the South West region. We absolutely recognise that as a Trust we don't have all the answers and that as well as sharing our knowledge, we can also always learn from organisations that are successfully doing very similar work to us in other parts of the country.

I am looking forward to a really great year in which we continue to strive to build on the successes of the Trust over the past few years. We are determined to deliver on our three key vision drivers of being;

- An Employer of Choice
- An Educator of Choice
- A Community Organisation.
