Darwin Class (Reception)

The highlight of our week has been having the most fantastic time speaking to Darwin Class children who are at home for a live story time - it was wonderful to see the smiling faces of our friends and hear about how they are doing! In class, we have adapted to the new routines and have had lots of fun. I have been super impressed by how well children have risen to the chal-

lenge of counting amounts up to 20 and recognising their numerals too! We have enjoyed the ice and frost outside in the garden and are going to learn more about why that happens at this time of year!



We have started some new, trickier digraphs in phonics and sentence writing, so watch this space.

This week has not been the start to the half term that we expected, but I am really proud at how hard everyone is working, at home and in school.

Seacole (Years 1 and 2)

In English this week, we have started looking at a new book called 'Ellsworth's extraordinary electric ears.' This book has some amazing images that show lots of objects that start with the different letters of the alphabet. It uses alliteration to create a sentence for each page.

In Maths, we have started to learn about multiplication and division. This week, we have been focusing on counting in twos, fives and tens with the year ones and have been working on recognising and counting equal groups in year two.

In Theme this week, we have been thinking about how we can be a good friend. I can see that Seacole class are excellent friends because they know all the good character traits to be a good friend.



Lewis Class (Years 3 and 4)

Miss Holland is really impressed with how well all the children have returned to their leaning after Christmas break and has found that Year 3/4 has been eerily quiet this week with lots of children accessing remote learning. We've started

looking at a new text, which is the story of a child from Egypt. This will lead on to us writing a narrative diary entry using another text in a couple of weeks' time.



There have been some lovely pieces of work created for our mini-topic on staying healthy, including posters about hand hygiene and instructions on teeth brushing.

This week has obviously all been about getting to grips with remote learning and I have to say that the children have been doing a great job. I have received a full range of work from the children at home including: Word documents, audio files, video clips and presentations. It has been really interesting reading the thought and feelings of the children both in and out of school as we are focusing on feelings as our PSHE topic during the first two weeks. Maths this week has been all about understanding decimals and they have grasped this concept brilliantly. In English the children have been reading our class book: The Tear Thief and have written some fantastic adverbial -filled sentences (see next page)
