Subordinating conjunctions


Extending the range of sentences with more than one clause by using a wider range of conjunctions, including when, if, because, although.

A conjunction is a word that acts as a 'joining word' connecting pairs or groups of words and clauses in a sentence. There are **two** main types of conjunctions we use within sentences.

- **Co-ordinating conjunctions** link two main clauses together as an equal pair to create a compound sentence. We usually remember these words using the acronym 'FANBOYS' (for, and, nor, because, or, yet, so).
- Subordinating conjunctions introduce a subordinate clause. You can remember some of the most useful subordinating conjunctions by using the acronym 'I SAW A WABUB'. This helps you to remember the first letters of some of the most important subordinating conjunctions.



Subordinating conjunctions are the first words within a subordinate clause. A subordinating clause is a part of a sentence that adds additional information to the main clause. A subordinating conjunction is simply the word/words that is/are used to join a subordinating clause to another clause or sentence.

Can you spot the subordinate clause and the subordinating conjunction in this sentence?

The eager pupils sped into school when the bell rang.

Here are some more examples:

Whales give birth to live young as they are mammals.

The hopeless rugby team lost the game because they hadn't trained.

Subordinating conjunctions can also be used as the first word in a sentence. When the subordinate clause comes before the main clause, make sure you remember to use a comma to mark where the subordinate clause ends.

When the bell rang, the eager pupils sped into school.

Unfortunately, their levels do not match the Accelerated Reader ZPD codes that your child has. But after having a look at some of the ebooks on AR book finder, this is a rough guide.

Oxford reading levels 1-5 and are below a ZPD of 2, Levels 6/7 are roughly at a ZPD of 2 and levels 8-13 are between 2.5 and 4. This is a rough guide so please check before reading.
