English home learning tasks

Writing tasks (complete in order)

This week we will be making a poster about sea turtles.



<u>Step 1)</u>

Watch these videos and look at the different websites. Make notes about the facts you find.

Remember when you write notes they don't have to be full sentences. You could write them as bullet points. For example:

- Different types of turtle: Olive Ridley, Leather back, Green
- Parts of a turtle: shell, head, flipper, eye

<u>Step 2)</u>

What is your poster going to be called? What will be your heading or title?

For example: <u>Everything you want to know about sea turtles</u>

Next, come up with some subheadings (titles for each section of your poster). For example: <u>Types of sea turtle</u>

Titles don't need a full stop but do need a capital letter.

<u>Step 3 & 4</u>

Write a paragraph about each subheading, using your facts you found in step one. For example, if you have a subheading called : <u>Sea turtles around the world</u> - then you will need to write sentences about the different places the sea turtles live .

Don't forget:

- Use capital letters to start your sentence and full stops (.) or questions marks (?) or exclamation (!) to mark the end of your sentences
- Leave spaces between words
- Join two sentences together using co-ordinating conjunctions (and, but, or) and subordinating conjunctions (when, if, that, because)
- Use capital letters for names of people and places. For example: Mexico or Costa Rica
- Use comma (,) for lists
- Use the correct spelling if you change a noun from singular to plural.

<u>Step 5</u>

Now you have all your facts ready for each subheading, create your poster. Don't forget to leave space for pictures. You might want to use a ruler to draw lines to write on to keep it neat. I have attached an example of how you could set out a poster with the different subheadings (the example is about sport but yours will be about sea turtles). If you can you could find pictures on the internet then you could print or copy them onto your poster.

Spelling

Practise your spellings that are highlighted on the spelling card. When you have learnt those move onto the next spelling card. You could do this by rainbow writing, 'look cover write check' or by seeing how many times you can write the word in a minute.

Oxford reading levels 1-5 and are below a ZPD of 2, Levels 6/7 are roughly at a ZPD of 2 and levels 8-13 are between 2.5
