| Remember in your description to use: adjectives (describing words), conjunctions (and, but, because, if, when). Also, remember to: Use capital letters to start your sentence and full stops (.) or questions marks (?) or exclamation (!) to mark the end of your sentences Leave spaces between words Use capital letters for names of people, places, the days if the week and the personal pronoun 'I' eg I went to the beach not i went to the beach Use comma (.) for lists Use the correct spelling if you change a noun from singular to plural. Use adverbs to describe how things are happening. Step 5 Create an acrostic poem about dragons.
